
But severe problems occurred during the rainy season when the sun refused to show up seemingly for days. The aunts lived on the edge of starvation.

Reception will honor retiring bishop

ishop John H. Ricard, who has been head of the Diocese of Pensacola-Tallahassee for the past 14 years, is retiring due to health reasons. On Sunday, people in Tallahassee will be able to wish him well during a reception at the Co-Cathedral of St. Thomas More.

"He is a humble and wise person, a really godly man," said the Rev. Michael Tugwell, the pastor of the Co-Cathedral, who hosts the bishop during his frequent visits to Tallahassee. "His strong leadership and his willingness to be pres-

ent will be missed."
Ricard, 71, was born in Baton Rouge and became a priest in 1968. He later earned a master's degree from Tulane University in New Orleans and a doctorate of philosophy from the Catholic University of America in Washington D.C.

In 1997, he became

bishop of the Panhandle diocese overseeing 48 parishes, nine missions, seven elementary schools and two high schools. Catholics in the area number more than 63,000.

Ricard, who suffered a stroke in December 2009, helped open John Paul II High School in 2001, something other bishops had talked about but he was able to accomplish, Tugwell said. Ricard was also a big supporter of the Florida Catholic Conference, which lob-bies against the death penalty and for pro-life causes, and the Christmas Connection, which provides food, clothing and other services to hundreds of people each year.

On the international level, Ricard has been the chair of Catholic Relief Services and the Catholic Bishops' Office of International Peace and Justice.

He has visited Tallahassee about two times a month for years, attending confirma-

tions, graduations and special events, such as the yearly December Mass at Mission San Luis or the blessing of the Christmas Connection warehouse.

He attended two such events at John Paul II high school recently, said school principal Sister Ellen ${f Cronan.}$

"He's gracious and . generous with his time," Cronan said. "He's been a positive influence on the teens, giving them support and encouragement and providing an

example of leadership." The Rev. Richard Schamber, a priest at

Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church, fondly remembers the bishop because he received the sacrament of confirmation from Ricard when he was 14. A decade later, Ricard ordained him-

Schamber still remembers the homily Ricard gave at the confirmation service about three people of the Catholic faith and how each was a unique witness for Christ.

"Nearly 14 years later, I remember the points from that homily," Schambers said.

Schambers said he would miss the stability that Ricard provided the diocese, which has had four bishops since 1975.

Tugwell said Ricard's hardworking, generous spirit also will be missed. He hopes the reception on Sunday is well-attended.

"I hope a lot of people come and say, 'Thank you' for his contribution to our area," he said. "He was such a servant of the church."
